John Burnham Schwartz Joins the Book Award

We are delighted to welcome John Burnham Schwartz as our new Book Award Administrator. Schwartz is the author of six acclaimed novels including *The Red Daughter, The Commoner*, and *Reservation Road*, the latter of which was made into a film based on his screenplay. He also brings considerable administrative experience as the longtime Literary Director of the Sun Valley Writers' Conference and an editor-at-large at Penguin Press. As Book Award Administrator, Burnham follows Charles Trueheart, former Library Director and founder of the award, and journalist Rachel Donadio, the 2022–2023 Administrator.



Schwartz is a recipient of a Lyndhurst Prize for mastery in the art of fiction, and his books have been translated into twenty languages. He has done extensive screen and television writing, including as screenwriter of HBO Films' *The Wizard of Lies*, starring Robert De Niro and Michelle Pfeiffer, for which he was nominated for a 2018 Writers Guild of America Award for Outstanding Writing.

In addition to his continuing role as Literary Director of the Sun Valley Writers' Conference and Editor-at-Large at Penguin Press, he hosts and co-produces the literary podcast *Beyond the Page: The Best of the Sun Valley Writers' Conference*. He lives in New York City with his wife, writer Aleksandra Crapanzano, and their son, Garrick.

The Book Award team is currently accepting <u>submissions</u> for the 2024 prize. The longlist will be announced in June, the shortlist in September, and the winner will be revealed at a special ceremony in November. 

TimesMachine from the New York Times Online

The *New York Times* online is our most popular digital resource, and is free with your Library membership.

Once you log in through your online Library account, you can explore the American "newspaper of record's" archives in two ways:

1) The *New York Times* Article Search allows you to search for and read recent and archived articles from 1851 through today.



2) The TimesMachine is a browser-based digital replica of all issues of the *New York Times* from 1851–2002. This means that you'll be able to view the paper as it was originally laid out in print. With TimesMachine, subscribers can browse scanned issues of the *New York Times*, download up to 100 PDFs per month, and share issues and pages with other *New York Times* digital subscribers.


Conversation in French


CALLING ALL COMPOSERS, LYRICISTS AND LIBRETTISTS IN PARIS!


The Female Khoros with Selby Wynn Schwartz
