# A Playful Season of Programs Ahead



This winter and spring at the Library, Evenings with an Author, sponsored by GRoW @ Annenberg, will celebrate the creative spirit of play.

We're thrilled to be partnering with renowned publishing house **Fitzcarraldo Editions** to bring you evenings with their top writers. Our language games will continue with **translation slams**, **creative workshops** on writing philosophical fiction and page-to-stage opera composition, and **poetry performances**.

Paris itself can be a playground of cultural activities, and we're spotlighting all that the city has to offer: **designer Idris Balogun** speaking on **Paris Fashion Week; Opéra Comique** and **Opéra Bastille** directors taking us behind the scenes; and an exclusive screening and Q&A with **American filmmakers** who earned recognition at **Cannes**. We're also celebrating the Franco-American music scene through **concerts** with American artists who take France as their muse. Naturally, we'll consider the history, practice, and cultural impact of the sporting event that will define summer 2024 in Paris: the **Olympics**.

We'll also be hosting some major figures. As part of our ongoing **residency programs**, **Patricia Lockwood**, **Stacy Schiff**, **Adam Shatz**, and **Miss America 2019 Nia Franklin** will be spending time amidst the Library community. We're welcoming back **Book Award 2023 winner Katherine J. Chen** as a speaker and workshop leader. Our Marquee event series will present **Barbara Kingsolver**, Pultizer Prize-winning author of acclaimed novel *Demon Copperhead*.

Finally, play is meant to be shared amongst friends. We are introducing a new **members-only Music** and Mingle series designed to bring our community closer together through the arts.

Grants from **GRoW** @ **Annenberg**, the **Florence Gould Foundation**, and **The de Groot Foundation** have made this programming possible, along with support from the **American Center for Art & Culture.** 

We look forward to a season of joyful connection as we learn from one another, create together, and inspire each other to play with new perspectives, ideas, and forms of art. In this time of renewal, with an ethos of open exploration, we embrace all that this new cycle may bring. We're excited to see you there.

# **Fashion Week: An Exclusive Review**



On **Monday 22 January at 19h3o**, the Library will present a special evening with **Idris Balogun**, founder and Design Director of luxury ready-to-wear brand Winnie New York.

Balogun was born to Nigerian immigrants in New York and raised in London. After training on London's Savile Row and working as Menswear Director at Burberry and Tom Ford, Balogun launched his own label in 2019, naming it after his grandmother. In 2022 Winnie New York won the <a href="LVMH Karl Lagerfeld Prize">LVMH Karl Lagerfeld Prize</a> for its innovative design.

Balogun will show his highly-anticipated fall/winter 2024–2025 collection during Paris Fashion Week this month. The collection was inspired by jazz poet Ted Joans, James Baldwin, Ernest Hemingway, and other twentieth century American writers who found their way to Paris.

Balogun will appear at the Library in conversation with internationally renowned stylist **Julie Ragolia** to review the fall/winter 2024–2025 Paris Fashion Week and assess the contemporary luxury landscape. We'll hear their thoughts on the meaning of clothing, the role of fashion in self-expression, and innovations at the horizons of modern design.



## Learning to Laugh with Nuar Alsadir

Why do humans laugh? What effect does laughter have on the body? What is its role in a social setting? What does it communicate, and why does it matter?

Poet and psychoanalyst Nuar Alsadir uses psychology, philosophy, history, personal experience, and more to answer these questions in her new book *Animal Joy*. A whimsical, wide-reaching meditation upon the power of laughter, populated by figures ranging from Donald Trump to Alsadir's classmates at clown school, the book reveals hidden dimensions to humor, while highlighting the challenges of defining what humor is. More than an expression of amusement, it can be wielded as a political tool, poetic instrument, and therapeutic mechanism.

# Fixing France: How to Repair a Broken Republic with Nabila Ramdani


# <u>Fashion Week: An Exclusive Review</u> with Idris Balogun of Winnie New York




