Book Award 2024 Winner The Rebel's Clinic: The Revolutionary Life of Frantz Fanon by Adam Shatz

Congratulations to Adam Shatz for The Rebel's Clinic: The Revolutionary Life of Frantz Fanon (Farrar, Straus and Giroux), winner of the twelfth annual American Library in Paris Book Award. The announcement was made before an audience of Library supporters on 7 November at the George C. Marshall Center in the Hôtel de Talleyrand on the Place de la Concorde.

In The Rebel's Clinic, Shatz offers a dramatic reconstruction of Fanon's extraordinary life—and a guide to the books that underlie today's most vital efforts to challenge white supremacy and racial capitalism. The book is a significant, readable, well-researched biography of Fanon and a brilliant, nuanced exploration of his ideas.



In awarding this year's prize, the 2024 Book Award jury—**Andrew Sean Greer** (jury chair), **Ayelet Waldman**, and **Jonas Hassen Khemiri**—wrote:

"An unflinching portrayal of a revolutionary figure torn between his ideals and inner turmoil. The personal story Shatz brings to life is remarkable but the book's real accomplishment is to illuminate the development of Fanon's ideology, political, intellectual and profoundly personal, even emotional. Shatz has given us a Fanon for all thinkers and readers, captured with freshness and clarity and vitality—a Fanon for our present moment."



About the winner

Adam Shatz is the US editor of the London Review of Books and a contributor to the New York Times Magazine, the New York Review of Books, the New Yorker, and other publications. He is also a visiting professor at Bard College, and the host of the podcast "Myself with Others," produced by the pianist Richard Sears.

Raised in Massachusetts, Shatz studied history at Columbia University and has lived in New York City since 1990. He is the author of three books: Prophets Outcast: A Century of Dissident Jewish Writing about Zionism and Israel (Nation Books); Writers and Missionaries: Essays on the Radical Imagination (Verso); and The Rebel's Clinic: The Revolutionary Lives of Frantz Fanon (Farrar, Straus and Giroux).

About the Award

Founded in 2013, The American Library in Paris's \$5,000 literary prize is given to a title originally published in English that best realizes new and intellectually significant ideas about France, the French people, or encounters with French culture.
