Creation Lake



Wild Thing: A Life of Paul Gauguin


by Sue Prideaux (Norton) An original and revealing portrait of the misunderstood French Post Impressionist artist.

An advisory screening panel led by the Book Award Chair and bestselling author **John** Burnham Schwartz selected the shortlist from a longlist of eight titles, which was announced in June 2025.

The winning title will be selected by an independent jury chaired by last year's winner, Adam Shatz, with fellow jurors Ruth Reichl and Claire Messud. The 2025 laureate will be announced at a ceremony on 7 November.
