

ANNOUNCING THE 2025 AMERICAN LIBRARY IN PARIS BOOK AWARD LONGLIST

The Book Award celebrates outstanding works of literature, both fiction and nonfiction, that draw on France as a timeless source of inspiration.

Created in 2013, the Book Award builds on the Library's century-long tradition of bringing France, its culture and history into dialogue with the wider world. It is open to books in all genres, originally published in English. The 2025 longlist includes 8 titles: from captivating memoirs to spellbinding novels.



Isola by Allegra Goodman

A young woman and her lover are marooned on an island in this epic saga of love, faith, and defiance set in 16th century France.



The Art Spy by Michelle Young

An unlikely heroine infiltrates the Nazi leadership during World War II in Paris to save the world's most treasured masterpieces.




Gertrude Stein: An Afterlife by Francesca Wade

The Elements of Marie

The shortlist will be revealed in September, and the winner will be announced at a ceremony in Paris in November. The 2025 laureate will be selected by an independent jury chaired by last year's winner, Adam Shatz, with fellow jurors Ruth Reichl and Claire Messud.

As is tradition, the Library will commission two copies of the winning title, hand-bound by Parisian artisans in a custom design found nowhere else. One copy is presented to the author, while its twin remains in the Library's special collection.

The Book Award also carries a \$5,000 prize, which is supported by generous funding from the Florence Gould Foundation.
